GROUP	BREEDS	ORIGINS
Toy	Papillion, Pug, Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, Maltese	Bred as companion animals, bred smaller in size
Terriers	Jack Russell, Fox Terrier, Border Terrier, Bull Terrier, West Highland Terrier	The word Terrier comes from the Latin word meaning 'Earth', and this is exactly what these wonderful breeds were required to do, go to the 'Earth' to flush out vermin and small animals.
Gundogs	Vizsla, Pointer, Labrador, Golden Retriever, Lagotto, Cocker Spaniel	Experts at hunting, divided into two groups- one to flush out the game (point) the other to retrieve (fetch).
Hounds	Beagle, Bassett, Daschund, Greyhound, Saluki, Whippet	Experts in hunting, divided into two groups – scent hounds, to track and follow scents, have endurance-sight hounds, motivated by movement, fast at catching prey.
Working	Border Collie, Kelpie, German Shepherd, Corgi, Cattle Dog,	Specifically bred for certain tasks which involve- herding, livestock protection, endurance,
Utility	Akita, Boxer, Dobermann, Mastiff, Schnauzer, Husky, Rottweiler	Bred specifically for guarding, protection whether it be people or livestock. Also some breeds in this group are bred for pulling, sledding and endurance.
Non- Sporting	French Bulldog, Dalmatian, Chow, Great Dane, Poodle, Shar Pei	Diverse group of breeds with different needs and characteristics.
