

MDA Purpose



Effective representation of local government and communities at state and federal level in the management of Basin resources by providing information, facilitating discussion and seeking to inform government policy



INFLUENCE		GOVERNMENT POLICY AND PRACTICE DECISIONS
2019 Motion 5.4		
That the Murray Darling Association calls on the Federal Government to provide ongoing assistance for drought preparedness in the form of low interest innovation, water infrastructure and drought assistance loans, training and professional development in business management for farmers and continued support for Rural Financial counsellors to work with farmers long term, with the understanding that drought is part of the normal cycle of farming and needs to be planned for.		The recent drought has taken a toll on communities across the entire Basin. The MDA has conducted meetings the Department of Infrastructure and the National Water Grid Authority in Canberra. The MDA advocated at those meetings the need for greater communication regarding how those two organisations plan for current and future drought cycles. The MDA has written to and met with the National Water Infrastructure Authority, and with the National Farmers Federation to explore strategies for local government to assist in drought preparedness.
2019 Motion 5.5		
That the Murray Darling Association call on the Federal and State Government to address the urgent need for action on the Darling Barwon river system to ensure that the supply of safe drinking water and flows for stock and domestic use is the priority at all times, including priority over and above the release of water from dams for large scale irrigation, irrespective of the circumstances in which allocations have been pre-purchased or pre-allocated for large scale irrigation.		Critical human water needs are the top priority under the Water Act 2007 followed closely followed by stock and domestic supply. The MDA also participated in stakeholder consultation with the NSW Government in the development of its Flood Plain Harvesting and Regulation. The MDA had written to and met with the NSW government, Basin Officials, the MDBA and Basin Ministers urging all support and encouragement required for NSW to meet this obligation. NSW has yet to complete its Flood Plain Harvesting Policy.


Remarkable times call for remarkable collaboration


