

Blackwood Community Hub project takes shape

The construction of the Blackwood Community Hub has reached an exciting new phase following the pouring of the cement base and delivery of the steel works ahead of the installation of the walls and roof.

Despite some delays due to wet weather, other recently completed work includes the laying of conduits, pad footings, and grinding of the aggregate cement floor for the main foyer area.

The car park at Edward Street is now open and features permeable pavers that allow

stormwater to soak into the verges, boosting the growth of new trees and native grasses planted at the site, and reducing the 'urban heat island' effect.

The Blackwood Community Hub is expected to be completed by mid-2023.

Let's chat cats!

You had your say on Council's draft By-laws and helped shape your city.

From pets to playgrounds, waste and signage, the City of Mitcham By-laws are established to ensure that Council can respond to issues within the local area and assist us in protecting our community.

The City of Mitcham is set to introduce new cat confinement laws to help Mitcham's cats live longer and healthier lives, while better protecting native wildlife.

Being a cat owner is enjoyable and rewarding, however brings with it responsibilities.

As a pet owner, it is your responsibility to ensure your cat is happy and healthy and is not negatively impacting the community in any way.

Cats born or registered from 1 January 2024 must be confined.

Cat confinement is set to be introduced across the Council for cats born or registered on or after 1 January 2024. Confinement means keeping your cat on your premises 24

hours a day. This can include your house or apartment, an enclosed area in a backyard or courtyard, or a cat run or enclosure.

Cats born or registered before 1 January 2024 do not have to be confined. However, under an existing By-law clause, cat owners must continue to ensure their cats do not create a nuisance to other residents, even before this date, irrespective of their age.

We understand that cats and their owners may not be prepared for, or used to, full containment. The grandfathering approach for existing pet cats strikes the right balance to allow a fair and gradual transition.

Cat owners are invited to find out how changes to City of Mitcham's Cat By-laws will impact them at a free one-hour online seminar this month.

'Let's Chat Cats' will explore how these changes come into effect and share tips on how to contain cats happily, protecting them and our native wildlife from harm.

Why is cat confinement a good idea?

There are benefits to both your cat and your community when cats are confined to their properties.

The benefits of keeping your cat confined include:

- prevents fighting between cats and associated risk of infectious diseases or costly vet bills;
- prevents vehicle injury if roaming on the road; and
- protects cat from poisons or traps.

The wider community also benefits from cat confinement because cats are no longer able to defecate and urinate in other people's yards, or fight with other cats in other yards, and are less likely to harm native wildlife.

City of Mitcham residents are invited to commemorate the sacrifices of those who served Australia in wars or armed conflicts at a Centennial Park Remembrance Day Service.

The Service will take place at the Cross of Remembrance, overlooking Derrick Gardens, on Friday 11 November at 10.30am.

This designated area for returned and current service personnel is the final resting place of more than 4,500 service men and women.

In the lead-up to the day, Australian flags will be placed at memorials in Derrick Gardens by students from Springbank Secondary College. Walford Anglican School for Girls Choir and Scotch College Pipes and Drums Band will be part of the service, along with members from Re-Enact SA, Cadets from the Australian Navy, Australian Army and Royal Australian Air Force as well as The Barossa Light Horse Division.

Residents are welcome to place a wreath or personal tribute at the Cross of Remembrance after the laying of the wreaths by official guests.

The Repat celebrates 80 years

City of Mitcham residents are invited to join an 80 Year Celebration of the Repat Health Precinct from 11.30am to 5pm on Friday 11 November.

The free family-friendly community day will feature stalls, historic displays, food, face painting and live entertainment.

The Repat was established in 1942 and operated as the 105 (Adelaide) Military Hospital until 1947 when it became the RGH (Springbank).

The name changed to Repatriation General Hospital in 1967, and during the 1970s began accepting community patients, and became a teaching hospital.

Today, SA Health has established a number of services on site including the Neuro-Behavioural Unit, Specialised Advanced Dementia Unit, Bangka Strait and Statewide Rehabilitation Services.



On the day, there will be an opportunity to visit the Schools Patriotic Fund (SPF) Hall, Stadium, Remembrance Gardens, Hydrotherapy Pool and Chapel, which are open to patients and the community.

Heritage façade preserved

City of Mitcham's heritage-listed Mitcham Civic Centre building is undergoing restoration work to protect and restore its Art Deco façade.

Heritage building specialist Heritage Stone Restorations is working closely with Grieve Gillett Anderson heritage architects to deliver the refurbished facades

The works include cleaning of the existing render, repairs to cracking and render reconstruction to match original materials.

Restoration of the original building is now complete, and work is underway to restore the 1950s extension of the building off Newark Road.

A pedestrian walkway has been installed below scaffolding for the duration of the works, to be followed by landscaping of planter beds at the corner of Newark and Belair Roads.

The Chambers building was designed by architect Dean Berry and built in 1934 and features an English Rose in its façade, recognising Mitcham's English connections.

The building was extended in 1954 and 1960 and redeveloped in 2000.

Community garden grows connections

Two years since it first opened in Belair, Cherington Therapeutic Community Garden is growing connections in the community. Established with support from a City of Mitcham grant, the garden was designed in collaboration with Gardening Australia's Sophie Thompson as an initiative of the Cancer Care Centre.

The garden is run by organic grower Diana Bickford, of Bickley Vale Farm, whose grandparents once owned the historic property.

Diana says the garden has expanded to 20 wicking beds that produce vegetables and herbs, alongside butterfly and bee gardens, fruit trees and a compost area.

"We've turned the space into a productive food garden that is a demonstration model where the community can learn about growing food," she says. "With food security much more in people's minds, growing our own produce is increasingly important."

The garden is open to the community on Wednesdays from 10am to 12.30pm and hosts regular education programs and workshops including Seeds for Health and Herbs for Health.

Herbalist Sue Lohmeyer, who runs regular workshops, says the garden also aims to demonstrate the importance of wellbeing.

"We know there are huge health benefits for people when they take up gardening," she says. "We feel better when we're outside – even when it's raining."

Mitcham Primary celebrates 175 years

The oldest continuously operating school in South Australia, Mitcham Primary School, turns 175 this year.

The school began as a small hut, erected in 1847 on Mitcham Reserve, which opened as a combined chapel and school, paid for by subscription from local families.

A cabinet maker from London, Thomas Mugg, was employed as the school's first teacher.

Mugg continued teaching a very basic curriculum, enforcing strict discipline with regular use of a cane, until 1868.

As the school grew, it moved to Mitcham Institute in 1870, which functioned as a school and community hall until 1879.


A new purpose-built school was built on Bulls Creek Road (now Belair Road) in 1880. Three years later, the Mitcham Railway Station was opened next to the school on the new Adelaide-Aldgate line, which restricted expansion of the grounds.

The upper primary students relocated to Hillview Road, Kingswood, in 1953, joined by junior primary students in 1981.

In 2013, the junior and upper primary schools were consolidated under one Principal. Today Mitcham Primary predominantly serves the suburbs of Kingswood, Mitcham, Hawthorn, Netherby and Torrens Park.

City of Mitcham's permeable paving, treenet inlets and other Water Sensitive Urban Design initiatives will be on display and staff will be on hand to answer questions.


Hear from expert quest speakers, see displays by electric car and cargo bike owners, demonstrations on bike recycling and watch the Repair Café in action.

Mural highlights habitat loss

Glenalta artist and educator Fran Callen has worked with students from Eden Hills Primary School to create a mural for the school.

Fran set out to highlight the importance of Grey Box Grassy Woodland, an endangered ecosystem found in parts of the Adelaide Hills.

"I have noticed that a lot of trees are being removed and I wanted to raise awareness of how precious these places are," she said.

Students in Years 2 to 4 started the project by learning about the plants and animals that live in the woodland, then observing, sketching and creating collages.

The collages were painted, then shapes cut out to be installed along the external fence at the school, along with words from a variety of languages including Kaurna.

Free green waste days

Council provides free green waste days to assist residents prepare their properties for the upcoming Fire Danger Season. These will continue in November and December along with two free days in January and February.

This facility will be FREE with only green waste accepted - no rubbish. Green waste material can consist of grass cuttings, leaf matter and prunings (branches no larger than 200 millimetres or 8 inches in diameter). Proof of residency will be required. No commercial businesses.

The Lynton Green Waste Depot is at Beagle Terrace, Lynton.
