



Purpose

To update Elected Members on progress against Notice of Motion endorsed by Council on 23 February 2021 relating to homelessness

Notice of Motion



At its meeting of 23 February 2021 Council made the following resolution:

- 1. That Administration convene a meeting of service providers within the City of Mitcham (for example: housing, mental health, meals, welfare) to gain an understanding of their experience with homelessness within the City of Mitcham and recommendations for how Council can support or advocate on behalf of these service providers to improve community outcomes.
- 2. That a report be brought back to Council following this meeting to present the findings and opportunities.

What is Homelessness?



What is it?

Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) considers a person to be homeless if their living arrangement:

- ☐ Is in a dwelling that is inadequate
- ☐ Has no tenure, or a short tenure that can't be extended
- Does not allow control of / access to space for social interaction

Causes of homelessness

- Housing affordability stress
- ☐ Abuse / family violence / domestic violence
- Mental health
- ☐ Employment security
- ☐ Lack of community connection / support

Sizing the Problem



Scale of homelessness in South Australia (source: 2016 Cenus):
☐ Approx 8,000 people
☐ 60% male / 40% female / 20% aged 25 – 34
☐ 15% First Nations (population parity approx. 3%)
☐ 51% earn < \$400 per week
94% living in overcrowded / temporary / inadequate / supported shelter
☐ 6% sleeping rough (approx. 480)
LGA's with largest homeless populations (source: 2016 Census)
☐ Port Adelaide Enfield (751)
☐ City of Adelaide (644)
☐ Salisbury (627)
☐ Onkaparinga (485)

Largest Growing cohorts:

- First nations Peoples
- > Women > 50 years of age
- > Families with Children

Sizing the Problem - Locally



- ☐ Difficult to estimate with any reliability
- ☐ 2016 Census data suggests 199 people defined as homeless in CoM
- Applying state-wide percentages this translates to approximately 10
 - 12 people sleeping rough at any time

Responsibility:

- ☐ Primarily State Government historically
- Sector reformed 2021
- ☐ 5 Alliances operate in SA (North / East / South / West / Domestic & Family Violence)
- ☐ CoM falls under Adelaide South Region Toward Home Alliance (THA)

Historic Local Government Involvement



- ☐ There is precedence for LGA involvement based on circumstances
- ☐ Examples include City of Adelaide and Salisbury
- ☐ CoM has not previously invested directly in services or interventions around homelessness.
- ☐ Complicating factors for CoM include:
 - Knowing the size of the population Visibility is low
 - > Less of an issue compared with many other metro LGA's.
 - > Services focus on areas where homeless / rough sleeping population is highest and most at risk
 - ➤ City of Adelaide 250+ rough sleepers

Possible Collaborations



Administration met (on 27/5/22) with:

- City of Adelaide
- Toward Home Alliance
- Adelaide Zero Project
- Service focus is still heavily on CoA given demonstrable size of population and location of majority of support services.
- Partners indicated a desire to work with other LGA's (including Mitcham) late 2022 calendar year.

What Would it Look Like?



1. Connections Week

- Physically count and identify every person sleeping rough in CoM
- Conducted by physical inspection / audit at night with service providers / staff / volunteers / SAPOL
- Produces a 'By Name List' and allows every single person to be connected with services
- Only been done in CoA to date
- Must be done in a tight time window ideally a single night

What Would it Look Like?



2. Hosting Outreach Services

- Identify appropriate Council facilities (eg Libraries / Community Centres / Civic) to host outreach and support services
- May educate homeless cohorts who are unaware of support options
- May also allow us to reach out with other services such as vaccination / self-development programs

What Would it Look Like?



3. Training staff to appropriately intervene

- Identify appropriate staff who work in locations where vulnerable people sleep rough / access services (eg libraries / community centres / outdoor work force / community safety officers)
- Provide training to allow them to intervene safely and appropriately to connect people with services and check on their well-being

3 Options



- 1. Connections Week
- 2. Hosting Outreach Services
- 3. Training Staff to Intervene

What Would it Mean for Us?



Connections Week

- Our size would require more than 100 people to do this effectively
- Not guaranteed to succeed given the nature and size of our open and public space
- Training is complex and costly
- Safety risk would need SAPOL cooperation
- Likely discoverable cohort too small to justify cost of intervention

What Would it Mean for Us?



Hosting Outreach

- In-kind support via access to Community space
- Foregone revenue or activity in the space
- Appropriate support for staff and other community members using common / adjacent spaces may need to be considered

What Would it Mean for Us?



Training Staff to Intervene

- Significant training investment
- Diversion of staff time not currently budgeted
- Could 'increase' rough sleeping by drawing people to what is perceived as a 'safe' community *

* No rough sleeping is safe

Summary



- Tangible opportunities are limited in the short term and of debatable effectiveness
- It's hard to know whether the needle will move
- Where does this issue sit relative to other social issues?

- Current motion doesn't give scope for going any further
- Information Report to be brought back in August 2022

Purpose



To update Elected Members on progress against Notice of Motion on 25 May 2021 relating to community housing

Council Resolution



25 May 2021

- Recognise the importance of community housing
- In principle support to continue to play a direct role in service provision, and:

"4. That Administration identify the most appropriate City of Mitcham owned alternative community housing property site in consultation with Junction SA and bring a report back to Council for decision."

The Driver



- 2 properties on Edward St, Blackwood previously used for community housing
- These properties were subsumed into the Blackwood Community Hub site
- Can't build the Blackwood Community Hub carpark without them

Alternative Sites



Council owns 5 residences in residential zones:

- 1 & 3 Ayr Street, Torrens Park
- 1,3 & 5 Grange Rd, Lower Mitcham
- 5 Grange currently vacant

Consultation with Junction



- Junction Housing have inspected 5 Grange Rd and confirmed their interest
- Junction would need to expend approx. \$18K to \$20K on 5 Grange Rd
- Junction need a 3 year lease at a peppercorn rental to justify the \$18K to \$20K
- Junction would ideally like an option to extend the 3 year lease by a further 2 years

What's Next



- A decision report recommending to lease the residence at 5 Grange Rd to Junction Housing
- Lease term could be an initial 3 year period with a right to renew for a further 2 years
- Rental could be at a peppercorn if resolved by Council (noting \$20k p.a. on open market)

Carols at Kingswood Oval



What is it?

- Community Christmas celebration for audience of up to 4,200
- \$24.5k budget for 2022/23 plus anticipated community partnership (\$7k in 2021)

2021 Event recap

- COVID impacted. Attendance restricted to 3,000
- ❖ Increased event costs through fencing, security, hygiene, etc, partially offset by:
 - Less ancillary activities & less food / beverage options
 - Change to a grass roots performance approach with MC (no celebrity performers)

Community Feedback

- 86% happy or very happy
- 75% felt more connected with community
- Need more food and beverage outlets and more activities for kids
- Liked school / community performances, liked MC but needed a professional / celebrity performer

Carols at Kingswood Oval



2022 Event

- Likely to be a return to pre-COVID settings or very similar to pre-COVID settings
- ❖ Partnership looking positive local business enthusiastic about sponsorship. Optimistic of more revenue that 2021 (+\$7k)
- ❖ 2022 Budget Approved.
- Events Team will build on 2021 event within current financial resources

Australia Day Awards & Citizenship Event



What is it?

- Confer new citizens to City of Mitcham (between 75 100), 300 400 attendees
- Recognise Australia Day Award winners
- Celebration of our cultural origins and diversity
- \$22.7k budget for 2022/23

2022 Event recap

- Format changed significantly 2 weeks out due to COVID Omicron variant in community
- Activities cut as a COVID safety response
- Total cost \$23.5k (\$16k / \$7.5k CoM). 2021 was \$35k (\$20k grant / \$15k CoM)

Community Feedback

- Great understanding about COVID impact = gratitude the event still occurred
- Loved Welcome to Country
- Relaxed / friendly feel

Events Team have commenced high level planning
