Mitcham based youth arts company SAYarts is preparing to perform at the upcoming Adelaide Fringe festival.

On the Fringe, a performance ensemble for high school students, will perform 'I See You as the Moon Does' at Goodwood Theatre and Studios on Thursday 9, Friday 10 and Saturday 11 March.

The group of students in years 8 to 12 dedicated many hours to intensive rehearsals at Mitcham Community Centre across January, working alongside Director and Playwright Alby Grace.

SAYarts managing director Bec Pannell said the shows would kick off a busy year for the

theatre company, which has expanded to a second location at Prospect. "Drama helps build resilience, empathy and problemsolving skills and provides an outlet where kids can be themselves."

# Social justice advocate our Citizen of the Year

A social justice and sustainability advocate has been recognised as City of Mitcham's Citizen of the Year.

Blackwood resident Peter Cranwell was presented the award at City of Mitcham's Australia Day awards ceremony at St Marys. Peter and his wife Nancy have made an extraordinary commitment to their local and wider community since returning to Blackwood from Leigh Creek, in South Australia's outback, in the 1990s.

As the Project Manager of the Climate Action Resources Expo held at Blackwood in November, Peter brought together a host of speakers, along with workshops and displays, to raise awareness and share ideas on sustainable living.

He is heavily involved in the Blackwood Uniting Church, helping coordinate community classes, the Bike Shed and a range of new workshops including 'My Life Story' and 'A Life and Death Conversation' and offering space for new groups such as peerled mental health support group GROW.

Peter suggested the Church wall along the main road would be a great place for a mural, paving the way for a City of Mitcham Public Art grant funded mural by Cecile Gariepy in 2022. Peter and Nancy have been long-time supporters of migrant families and international students living in the local area, providing emotional and financial support. They also support First Nations communities, coordinating a 'Packing Day' event, gathering donations of clothing and goods for communities across Australia. A former engineer, Peter donates his time and skills in remote locations such as Oodnadatta and Mount Searle.

Peter and Nancy have dedicated many hours to supporting residents of the Minda House supported accommodation in Craigburn Farm. In collaboration with University of South Australia, Peter is working to establish a program at the Blackwood Uniting Church Bike Shed that supports people living with intellectual disabilities to use stationary bikes and virtual reality headsets.

Peter was a key driving force behind Blackwood Uniting Church choosing 2022 as a year of focus on environmental sustainability and climate action. Along with the Climate Expo, the Church offered screenings of '2040' and 'Regenerating Australia', well attended by the general public.

City of Mitcham Mayor Dr Heather Holmes-Ross paid tribute to the nominees and winners, who she said often do not seek recognition for themselves.



#### New citizens welcomed

As part of the Australia Day celebrations, City of Mitcham welcomed 71 new citizens from 23 countries.

New citizens were presented a range of gifts including a jar of Indigenous jam, a unity pin, representing a bright future for all Australians, a ticket to the Royal Adelaide Show and a native Australian seedling symbolising the planting of roots in Australia.

Dr Holmes-Ross said: "We take enormous pride in your decision to become an Australian citizen and look forward to working together for the future of this nation."

# CITY OF MITCHAM ANNUAL REPORT HIGHLIGHTS 2021/2022

During 2021/22 we delivered a range of exciting projects and initiatives across our open spaces, reserves, libraries and community centres, supported by the invaluable contribution of our volunteers. Council published its full 2021/22 Annual Report in December 2022. Some of the highlights are set out below.

# YourSay Mitcham

We launched the YourSay Mitcham website to make it easier for residents to connect with Council, provide feedback about important projects and be kept up to date on the latest local news.

Changes to the online request system also made it easier and faster to contact us. We shared more local news by increasing circulation of our Mitcham Community News magazine to monthly.

### **Connecting our community**

We installed six new playgrounds, extended our footpath network and implemented pedestrian-focused traffic upgrades across the city.



# **Blackwood Community Hub**

Construction of the Blackwood Community Hub got underway, an exciting project that is set to create a vibrant community precinct and generate local jobs and investment.

#### **Animals and Reserve access**

We implemented a new text message system to inform dog owners when local reserves are being maintained so that they can plan alternatives when walking their dogs.



# **Community celebrations**

We welcomed the return of a COVID-friendly Carols at Kingswood Oval and invited local schools to help us plant trees at Monalta Reserve, Belair, on Arbor Day. During History Month, we hosted exhibitions across our community centres and libraries, and we launched new tree trails as part of Adelaide National Park City month.

#### **Move it Mondays**

This program provided older residents the opportunity to attend free or low-cost exercise programs at Hewett Sporting Hub.

# **Renewable Energy Program**

City of Mitcham became the first Council in South Australia to launch a Renewable Energy Program, offering residents access to bulk buy discounts on solar panels and batteries and a virtual power plant.

#### **Pasadena Biodiversity Corridor**

The Pasadena Biodiversity Corridor project has improved biodiversity across two reserves in Pasadena. This jointly funded (state-Council) project has reinstated water flows on a previous creek line by diverting to the surface stormwater piped beneath the Sierra Nevada and Grant Jacob Reserves.



### Water Sensitive Urban Design

We continued to incorporate water sensitive urban design measures into our asset and maintenance program, this year rolling out 10,300 sqm of permeable paving which, along with kerb inlets, will increase the uptake of water by street trees. Council also contributed to the Brown Hill Keswick Creek Stormwater Board to mitigate serious flood risks and safeguard properties across the catchment through the delivery of infrastructure works.

#### Weed Spatial Mapping trial

We trialled the expansion of Forestree Tree Management Software to coordinate Council's weed management program, helping prioritise and assign works, manage risk, along with the collection and storage of data.

#### **Tree Viewer Map**

We launched an online Tree Viewer tool to track our growing tree canopy. Residents can now explore where trees have been planted, future tree planting locations, information on tree species and a link to allow residents to request a new tree.

#### **Electric Vehicle Transition**

Council continued to trial Electric Vehicles as part of its fleet, and committed to the purchase of more, as part of a transition plan that considers the life-cycle costs of these vehicles, infrastructure and charging requirements.

# Heritage Standards Reference Group (Colonel Light Gardens)

A panel of community members, Council representatives and experts created Heritage Standards for the Public Realm in Colonel Light Gardens. These guiding principles help inform updates to Council's Community Land Management Plans and Conservation Management Plans.

# **Natural Disaster Support**

During state emergencies, including the Coles fire in the state's south-east and widespread flooding in the state's north, Council staff worked across all levels of government and with several agencies to coordinate the response, highlighting the important role of local government during emergency events.

# Special Residential Character Areas

Special Residential Character Areas are local areas that exhibit desirable character attributes that give a community its identity. The City of Mitcham updated its Development Plan to reflect these areas that encompass parts of Cumberland Park, Westbourne Park, Hawthorn, Springfield, Belair, Blackwood, Eden Hills and Coromandel Valley. These updates protect and maintain the residential character of these areas and have been approved by the Minister for Planning.

# Library partnerships

Council partnered with external bodies including Greening Australia and the Australia Bureau of Statistics (Census hubs) to host a range of activities in our libraries.

# Centenary of Colonel Light Gardens

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A celebration of the history of Colonel Light Gardens was held at the Mitcham Memorial Library and other locations to mark the heritage listed garden suburb's centenary. This included an exhibition, author talks and other community events.

### **On Track – STEAM Education**

'On Track' is a collaboration between five councils - Unley, Mitcham, Holdfast Bay, Marion and Wattle Range - that delivers STEAM themed activities aimed at upper primary school aged students. The topics included electronics and circuitry and coding and astronomy.

### Pasadena Community Centre

In 2022 Council took the first steps towards creating a new Pasadena Community Centre to cater for residents of the western suburbs with the purchase of a former Sea Scout Hall, and community consultation to find out what residents would like to see happen at the site.

### Visit Mitcham – Heritage and Trails App

Council launched the Visit Mitcham – Heritage and Trails App. The App includes an interactive map of the City that pinpoints the locations of places of interest, cemeteries, trails, walks and key Council locations such as our Civic Centre and libraries. The App has information about key places of interest, our history, and visitors can go on self-guided walks including the Abbottshall Precinct, Mitcham Village and Blackwood Historical walks.



# Real time bin data

Improvements have been made to video technology onboard our waste collection vehicles. With access to video footage, we can reduce the time taken to resolve missed bin requests and identify which bins need to be repaired or replaced.

### **Building condition audit**

An audit of all Council-owned buildings has enabled us to prioritise renewal works. Many of the improvements relate to improving accessibility to meet the needs of the community.

#### **Grants program**

In recognition of the importance of community-led projects, we increased our grants offering and streamlined the application process to ensure faster and easier access to funds. During 2021-22, a total of \$110,012 was awarded to support community projects across the city.

Significant work has been undertaken to collate spatial data held across multiple platforms into one platform. Bringing this data together has enabled staff to identify synergies, opportunity and overlaps between projects and work more efficiently.

Last year I was honoured to be elected as the Local Government representative to the Australia Day Council of SA (ADCSA) board, a position I continue to hold, and thoroughly enjoy. The ADCSA is an independent, non-profit, member-based association, whose purpose is to celebrate outstanding and inspirational people within the South Australian community.

The Citizen of the Year Awards is a program of the ADCSA run in collaboration with the 68 councils across the state. The Awards acknowledge the unsung heroes of our community who, through their contributions, make our state a better place. The ADCSA and participating councils call for nominations of individuals and organisations who have made a noteworthy contribution during the current year, and/or given outstanding service over a number of years, to their local community, over and above normal employment duties. Anyone can nominate a person (or group) for an award in one of four categories. These are the Citizen, Young Citizen, or Community Event of the Year, and the Award for Active Citizenship.

The Awards are presented by councils, usually as part of their Australia Day celebrations, in addition, councils can forward the details of their Award recipients to ADCSA to go in the running for the State Awards. Presented by the Governor at a ceremony at Government House, the South Australian Citizenship Awards are presented along with two other prestigious ADCSA awards: the Inspiring South Australian Women's Award and the Award for Leadership in Languages and Cultures.

At Mitcham, our Citizen of the Year Awards recipients are chosen by a selection panel comprising staff, Elected Members, the Mayor and the previous year's recipient(s). It was an absolute pleasure for me to present the City of Mitcham 2023 Citizen of the Year to Mr Peter Cranwell, with his award as part of Mitcham's recent Australia Day festivities at St Marys Park. Peter was a standout candidate who exemplifies the selflessness of spirt common to our Citizenship Award recipients whose outstanding service and tireless efforts enhance and strengthen our communities.

The NADC works with the affiliate state and territory organisations (ADCSA in South Australia) to recognise the achievements and contributions of eminent Australians. The ADCSA awards the South Australian, Young South Australian, Senior South Australian and South Australian Local Hero of the Year, with the National Award winners selected from the state and territory recipients. Babbage Ward encompasses the suburbs of Bedford Park, Pasadena, Panorama, Lynton and parts of Clapham, Eden Hills and St Marys.

It is a great honour to be elected to represent the people of Babbage. I am working hard to get my head around the day-to-day functioning of the city, and I have been learning a lot. A little introduction: I live in Bedford Park with my partner and two young girls; Charlotte and Molly. Our girls attend Daws Road ELC at the bottom of Dorene Street, and we make good use of the local amenities including Riverside Reserve, Sierra Nevada Boulevard Playground and Mitcham Memorial Library. I am a paramedic of eight years with SA Ambulance Service (and London Ambulance for a time). I can make an impact in people's lives being a paramedic, but these interactions can be as short as an hour. I wanted to make longer-term difference and being a member of Council provides that opportunity.

I believe the only way to understand the issues is to talk to the people who live in the area, so that's what I did. I was privileged to speak to hundreds of residents during the election by knocking on more than 2000 doors. There were many issues raised including traffic safety, playgrounds, footpaths and the quality and maintenance of green spaces. These will be my focus for my time in council as well as continued development of Mitcham's environmental credentials.

#### Traffic

The most urgent issues I am advocating for are those of safety, particularly regarding the traffic situations in Pasadena, St Marys, Panorama, Clapham and Lynton. With the upcoming development of the North South Corridor and the southern entrance to the tunnel on South Road. St Marys, I have sat down with Mayor Holmes-Ross, my fellow Babbage Ward Councillor Yvonne Todd, and Mitcham traffic engineers to get a greater understanding of what we can advocate for in and around this area. The increasing volume of traffic using St Marys and Pasadena as a shortcut is not safe and creates an increased risk to residents with poor driving behaviours. A significant traffic study in St Marys and Pasadena has been promised by the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and this will help us understand how to appropriately combat this problem, preventing further deterioration of the situation as the work begins.

Through-traffic in Panorama, Clapham and Lynton is also an escalating issue as it becomes harder to exit the suburbs onto Springbank Road. Council is continuing to liaise with DIT to find appropriate solutions and has requested recent traffic studies undertaken at the intersection of Eliza Place and Springbank Road, Panorama. I am soon meeting with our local MP Nadia Clancy to pursue solutions to these problems. A recent accident at the corner of Boothby and Strathcona was highlighted by residents and is an example of the wider traffic problems in the area (this incident is being looked at by Council staff).

I would be very keen to hear from members of the community regarding any issues they face or just want to have input into the development of our city.

The Park Ward encompasses the suburbs of Glenalta, Hawthorndene and parts of Blackwood, Belair, Coromandel Valley, Upper Sturt and Crafers West.

It is a wonderful privilege to be a newly elected member for The Park Ward. During the campaign, it was fantastic to meet so many people across the ward, getting an opportunity to talk about local issues and what you want to see from your Council over the next four years

- thank you to those who took the time to chat and vote. Mitcham residents are passionate about their local area, once again highlighted by having the highest turnout of any council in metropolitan Adelaide, with The Park Ward having the second highest turnout.

The Council term started quite literally with a bang, seeing one of the largest storms in the city's history hit on the day votes were being counted. The impact was substantial, resulting in a massive clean-up effort, disrupting local business, power outages and creating significant expense for both private individuals and Council. Fundamentally though, while many of these impacts are short-term, the impact on our tree canopy was substantial and will take decades to recover.

Our tree canopy is a source of significant pride for Mitcham residents, especially in The Park Ward where tree loss was the second most raised issue I heard about. Storm events like this, however, do highlight the downside of trees when they drop branches.

To this extent, Council is auditing every tree that it manages in the areas badly impacted by the storm. So far, Council has audited 9,628 trees across Hawthorndene, Craigburn Farm, Bellevue Heights and with 60% of Blackwood complete. Of these, 430 trees will need additional work. The remaining suburbs of Coromandel Valley, Eden Hills, Belair, Glenalta and Upper Sturt will be done shortly. You can read more on page 12. This loss in tree canopy will also have an impact on our fauna and suburb character. Trees also play a significant role in reducing storm damage by acting as a wind break, highlighting just one reason that it is important to retain as many as possible after this freak storm event. "Mature trees provide a windbreak to reduce high wind speeds and provide protection for homes and gardens." ~ Green Adelaide

Finally, we are already down to business with this new Council. At the second meeting, a petition for a public toilet at Suffolk Reserve was presented to Council with some 344 signatures. A special thank you to local residents Seth Tiddy and Trudy from GD Wholesale for being instrumental in getting this petition off the ground. Last year was a festival of democracy with elections at all levels of government with the scrutiny and accountability that only an election can provide. Congratulations to all the successful candidates and thank you to everyone who participated throughout the year. I am working with Council with a view to improving the signage and making other improvements to assist residents who need to use these exit points in the future.

# **Gallery offers glimpse into past**

An installation of historic photos will bring the past a step closer for visitors to the Mitcham Institute Hall at Mitcham Cultural Village.

The series of photographs sourced from the Mitcham Local History Service collection have been enlarged, printed on canvas and installed along the walls of the Institute Hall. Printed on acoustic panels, they will also improve the acoustics and ambience of the site.

Images include a portrait of Reverend Thomas Playford (1795 - 1873), the original Edinburgh Inn, from the 1800s, and an

original Butchers Shop from Princes Road, Mitcham, dated 1893.

The installation is part of an upgrade of the Mitcham Institute, which includes painting, paving, stone wall restoration, supper room area refurbishment and a return to polished floors.

Built in 1870, the Institute now houses Gallery One, an exhibition space, and a grand piano donated by Marcia Davis and family last year.

Service is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 9am to 1pm at Mitcham Cultural Village, 103-105 Princes Road, Mitcham, phone 8372 8261.

The Zeitter & Winkelmann grand piano was purchased by Marcia's mother Estelle Schrapal in Tanunda in 1920 and is now enjoyed by City of Mitcham residents and visitors to the Institute.

# Tree audit drives storm recovery

A street tree audit has revealed the extent of damage to City of Mitcham's tree canopy in the wake of a November storm that affected large parts of our hills and southern suburbs.

As of January, 9,600 street trees and many reserve trees had been assessed in Hawthorndene, Craigburn Farm, Bellevue Heights and parts of Blackwood.

Of those, approximately 430 trees have been identified as requiring follow up work including the removal of hanging branches and pruning to improve safety.

Upcoming suburbs in the post-storm audit include the remainder of Blackwood, Eden Hills, Coromandel Valley, Glenalta, Belair and Upper Sturt.

Trees identified in the audit are tracked using City of Mitcham's Forestree tree management software, a tool which has mapped Council's 56,000 street trees.

Council is working with contractors and its own tree specialist crews to undertake the follow up work, due to commence this month. City of Mitcham Senior Arborist Chris Tozer said where possible, badly damaged significant trees would be retained and pruned to create habitat for native wildlife.

"We recognise that the storm damaged significant trees still provide great

environmental and aesthetic benefits," he said. "We are focussing our efforts on retaining these trees through veteran tree management and habitat pruning, which provides hollows and nesting areas for our fauna."

In the weeks and months following the storm, Council opened its Lynton Green Waste Depot for extra days, organised a second kerbside green collection for worst hit suburbs, and created temporary bulk green waste

stockpiles at Eden Hills and the Women's Memorial Playing Fields. Many hundreds of tonnes of green waste has been mulched and placed on Council reserves and public areas including the Wittunga Botanic Garden at Eden Hills.

If you are a resident with extra green waste, please do not place on your verge. A free green waste day at Lynton is scheduled for Saturday, 18 February. Find out more at mitchamcouncil.sa.gov.au/green-waste
