### Message from the Mayor

This month I am absolutely delighted to bring you an update on Council's community solar plan. You may recall that in September I reported that we were seeking expressions of interest (EOI) from prospective partners to work with Council to investigate, design, and deliver a community solar power model to provide solar panels with no upfront cost to residents and provide access to cheaper power. In response to the tender process, 205 organisations downloaded the EOI from the Tenders SA website, 15 organisations requested a meeting with Administration to better understand the project before submitting a proposal, and 14 formal submissions were received.

The quality of all submissions was outstanding, and the level of innovation being contemplated by the renewable energy

sector was significant. From the 14 formal submissions received, we learnt that:


- There are organisations that are prepared to work with Council to develop a partnership model that would provide access to renewable energy technologies for City of Mitcham ratepayers at no up-front cost.
- There are a number of roles Council can play in a financial sense, ranging from providing no funding whatsoever, underwriting debt, to providing direct funding (or any mix thereof). In the scenario where Council provides no funding or financial contribution, its value proposition is as a trusted advisor to community connecting people to the most suitable renewable energy solution in their circumstance (in what is a complex and competitive market).
- The value of energy as a stored commodity (such as via batteries) is such that upfront capital investment, interest costs, administrative costs and profit margins for providers can be recovered over time.
- The majority of submissions were centered on the creation of a City of Mitcham Virtual Power Plant, where energy is aggregated and sold 'behind the meter'.
- Technology development in this sector is moving very fast, and what is possible now wasn't necessarily viable two years ago.

Having received these submissions, the next step is to shortlist and select a suitable partner candidate

Because Local Government has not traditionally played a central role in renewable technologies or infrastructure, we have decided to create a panel of experts to assist in the selection of a preferred strategic partner. To this end, Elected Members recently voted to engage external legal and renewable energy experts to sit alongside our staff who have the skills expertise in relation to navigating financial, reputational, or governance risks. The panel will assess the suitability and viability of current and emerging renewable technologies, the contractual implications between Council, the successful partner, and the end user, and competition law in so far as it proves to be relevant. Ultimately it will advise on the design and development of a viable pilot which will be brought to Elected Members for a decision to proceed.

I am really thrilled to be part of a Council that is prepared to be so innovative. Should this project be endorsed, we will have created the most sensational outcome for residents, businesses, tenants and landowners alike.


### Have your say on AA Bailey Reserve Public Toilet Replacement

### Friends of the Gamble Garden celebrates 35 years

City of Mitcham hosted a morning tea to celebrate 35 years of the Friends of the Gamble Garden, a group of volunteers whose work has ensured the survival of one of Australia's few remaining examples of an original worker's cottage garden.

The garden and cottage were bequeathed to City of Mitcham by sisters Clara and Edith Gamble in 1982.

Today the garden is maintained by the Friends; the cottage is managed by the National Trust of South Australia Coromandel Valley and Districts branch.

Gwen Gardner was one of the first to join the Friends when it formed in 1986 and remembers when she started the cottage had no running water, electricity or access to toilets, and she would bring her own tools from home.

"I loved gardening and it has been an outlet for me," she said. "I've learnt a lot and enjoyed the company."

Friends' Vinka Djukanovic said the group had grown over the years and their hard work was reflected in the magnificent garden.

"Come back and visit over the seasons and let this garden weave its magic," she said. "It's a truly special place."

Gamble Garden, 296 Main Road, Blackwood, open to the public every day; garden tours and afternoon teas held on the third Sunday of each month, February to November.

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Recently I had the opportunity to visit two recycling plants – Jeffries and Suez, and it was interesting to see how these plants operate.

- Only 60% of what goes into your recycle bin gets recycled. It is imperative that from the outset, we put things into the correct bin or it could end up in landfill.
- 7.6 million tonnes of organic waste goes into landfill each year because it goes into the wrong bin, where this should be turned back into compost as part of the circular economy. Place green organics, like your vegie scraps, into the green bin. It only takes 10-12 weeks of processing to convert this into soil or compost for agriculture. Only 13% of all food organics are disposed of correctly!
- 35% of waste from supermarkets is organic and needs to be un-packaged before disposal, taking time and money.
- Processed rubbish (that is either not recyclable or organic matter) that can be burnt is provided to Adelaide Brighton Cement which saves it going to landfill. This plant produces PEF (processed engineered fuel) to make cement. At present some 600 tonnes a day of commercial or industrial waste is turned into PEF which results in only 5% ending up in landfill. An incredible process of sorting and crushing to produce useable energy with minimal effect on the environment.

When your rubbish bins are collected next, think for a moment of the processes of collection, sorting, shipping, recycling, producing and reselling that are involved.

As a child I remember how little rubbish we produced. All our vegie scraps were given to the chickens, and in return we had manure for the garden with fresh eggs each day. Milk was delivered to by the milkman in glass bottles that were collected next day ready for refilling. Bread was also delivered fresh to the door wrapped with a small piece of tissue paper around the middle, no plastic bread bag or milk carton in sight. You could buy groceries in bulk by weight, bringing in your container to be filled, and all fruit and vegies were sold loose, as was meat, which was wrapped in butcher paper (no individual plastic trays!).

Whilst our lifestyles have changed considerably, we now have a society that makes so much rubbish which could be corrected quite easily by going back to some of the principles that were in place in the 'good old days'. If we changed our buying habits it would in turn put pressure on the food industry and supermarket chains to change the way they sell to us.

Wouldn't it be nice to see a discounted section for fruits and vegetables that were not visually perfect, but just as nutritious? A few simple but sensible changes such as buying loose produce, meat from the butcher and pantry contents in bulk where possible all help our part in saving our environment. Just one small change each can make a big difference.

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Recently the Mayor challenged Councillors to set out what they have been most proud of in this term of Council and to also set out what they wanted to achieve in the remaining 12 or so months.

#### What I'm most proud of

Firstly, I am proud that I have been an independent voice for the local community, and I have heard that the community supports:

- Blackwood Community Hub commencement in December 2021
- Rapid response to COVID-19, including rate relief for businesses affected
- Enhanced Council efficiencies and effectiveness, with the efficiency dividend rising to \$800,000 per year, up from \$500,000 per year
- Early action on climate change and more to come, reflecting the climate emergency we are facing, and
- Enhanced Council tree planting programs and community led Arbor Day plantings.

All of these actions have responded to community sentiment for positive change and to deliver stronger services, with better value for money. I am pleased to have been at the centre of all these decisions and directions.

I am also personally proud that I have listened and acted on community issues.

#### Some key examples:

- Standing up for the 195-196, 197X bus routes when they were at risk from State cuts
- Standing up for the local community against the soccer fields proposal for the old golf course at Belair National Park.

These were critical moments to display support for the local community and I was pleased to bring motions on each of them on behalf of the community.

### What I want to see in the next 12 months

I want to see the Blackwood Community Hub underway and almost completed – this is the most transformational project for Blackwood in a generation.

I also want to start a community discussion about the development of the old Blackwood Library and Karkoo nursery sites. This will be transformational as well.

I want to protect the services at the Blackwood Community Recreation Centre by seeing Council enter a long-term lease for the building with Department for Education. The health benefits for all, and for over 60s in particular from this service, should be a core and abiding service for Council and I will defend this strongly. I will also be seeking further support through a subsidy for over 65s' use of health services.

Lastly, I want Mitcham to continue embracing the net zero future, with the continued roll-out of low emission vehicles and charging infrastructure, community level virtual power plants and the continued tree plantings and water sensitive urban design strengths of Mitcham.

#### What I've heard from the community



You would recall that Council purchased the gravel parcel of land between Drakes and the 'Red Building' to create a N-S landscaped walkway between the Hub and shopping precinct and for a developer to build shops facing into the walkway. The project is being finalised and I believe the community will be delighted by both the developer and the outcome.

Following Council's decision not to renew the lease with the Rec Centre (which I did not support), Council has received a response from the Minister for Education. The Minister is supportive of the Rec Centre Association continuing to operate the centre and reiterated that Council should be part of both the lease arrangements and have some responsibility for maintenance. Discussions are continuing and I am hopeful of a resolution that works for all.

Council has recently seen the community feedback (700 responses) regarding the possible opening of Star Lily and/or Verdelho Streets, Craigburn Farm and will decide on this matter over the coming weeks. We also took the opportunity to ask residents about their bushfire plans and for the first time have some actual data about residents' preparedness. The excellent news is that 90 per cent of respondents do have a Bushfire Survival Plan, however, concerningly about 20 per cent of respondents living in Craigburn Farm do not have plans. Among all respondents, approximately one-third leave early on an Extreme Fire Danger Days and two-thirds leave on a Catastrophic Fire Danger Days. I strongly encourage households to take personal responsibility for their safety by making a bushfire plan that suits their circumstances as well as working with the CFS and Council on other strategies.

In closing, Happy Birthday to Colonel Light Gardens which turns 100 this year, to the wonderful volunteers at Gamble Garden, Blackwood, celebrating 35 years of service, to the Friends of Belair National Park celebrating their 36th and 130th anniversary of the park and the Blackwood Uniting Church celebrating the 100th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone. Congratulations to Pauline Dodd who fully deserves her Westfield Local Hero Award.

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This month we have started to prepare the budget for the next financial year. Over the coming months we will be working through the long-term financial parameters, new service requests, rate modelling, etc., as we develop Council's 2022/23 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

The first consideration was whether Council wishes to re-prioritise any of its existing services. Changes to existing services often require a lead time to implement, which is why they are the first consideration. To start our process we had a list of services and their budget for this financial year.

The City of Mitcham spends over \$60 million per year on services. The biggest expense is for roads and transport: \$14,920,000. It comprised not only road maintenance, but also footpaths, kerbing, traffic management, bridges and culverts. The second biggest expense goes to environmental works: \$11,150,000. To this category belongs streetscaping, stormwater management, street lighting, street cleaning, protection of the environment, agricultural and pest control. In the third place is waste management with \$9,680,000. The lowest expense in the service category was for cultural services - \$490,000. That includes the Mitcham Heritage Research Centre, Heritage Restorative Fund, Mitcham Village Institute, heritage items and plaques, civic and community events, Australia Day celebrations, citizenship ceremonies and Christmas Carols.

The next step in budget deliberations is to collect funding requests and decide which of them is to be funded. If you have ideas for both ongoing and one-off requests for consideration, please contact me. When it comes to development at City of Mitcham, from 1 July 2021, 654 development applications were lodged, totalling \$148 million.

On this topic I would like to mention that the public consultations are undertaken in accordance with the requirements of the new Planning and Design Code, that is letters sent to any properties within 60 metres of the subject land and an A3 sign installed on the boundary of the land, e.g. attached to the fence. The final decision maker about the application is the Council Assessment Panel, which consists of four independent and only one Council member.

In the middle of October I participated in the meeting of the Grants Committee. We allocated \$51,372 to applicants of the August 2021 Grant Round. One group needed support for an ethnic event, others for community garden improvement, teaching crafts, helping koalas, purchasing a laptop or defibrillator, and many other good causes. Maybe you didn't know we have some recurrent grants too: for a scholarship of the Australian Refugee Association and Harvey Hayes Memorial grant of the Flinders University; Mitcham City Brass Band; ANZAC Eve Vigil of the Blackwood & Districts RSL. Five groups of Scouts and Guides are supported by a rate rebate.

The most interesting experience of the last weeks? The WW1 Mitcham Army Camp exhibition at the Mitcham Memorial Library. The Barossa Light Horse Historical Association, Peter Foster and Mitcham History Association presented a rich, highly informative and certainly enjoyable exhibit.

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On 26 October I successfully proposed a motion that Council funds the implementation of the Christmas Celebration Space at CC Hood Reserve again. The motion was passed, which means that CC Hood will be lit up with decorations and singing again. It was loved and enjoyed by us all last year, with lots of community engagement. Merry Christmas everyone.

I recently had a call from a resident, Mrs Wood, to say how pleased she is that we now have a Pasadena community centre. She explained how a group of people lobbied for a community centre in the seventies but had not been successful. I thank Mrs Wood, and all the many local people who quietly worked for the community and paved the way for this initiative. Since my September newsletter, I was successful with my motion for \$38,000 funding for St Marys Sports Association to complete additional slab, drainage, electrical and plumbing work in the current project. The park and club house is such a positive, useful community space.

On 2 November, I'll move that Council investigate the feasibility of constructing a car park, with landscaping and pedestrian walkway, on the road reserve land that runs between Dorene and Denis Street, St Marys and bring a report back with a draft concept plan and indicative costs. Denis Street parking is congested due to the success of the businesses, and it would be good to reinvigorate the space on unused land.

Also, in the November agenda I have a motion asking for a staged removal and replacement of three trees on the northeast side of Spiers Avenue, Pasadena, because residents think they are dangerous and unsuitable for the street. I would not usually ask for any trees to be removed, but these trees have very spiky foliage which injures people and pets. Tree removal is an unusual situation, but I believe we must have an environment that is safe for people to live in. A staged process of removal and replacement spread over years would meet everyone's needs.

The long awaited Dorene Street road and footpath replacement with new landscaping will commence soon and will make a greatly needed improvement to the area. Plans include part of the Flinders to City Bikeway and reinvigorating the little rose garden pocketpark on corner of Merriton and Dorene streets. Work was delayed due to waiting for SA Water to finish relocating services from South Road to Dorene Street.

I met with the Manager of Engineering to discuss requests for new footpaths and road works. In 2021 there are several roads and kerbs being renewed in Babbage Ward, but only two new footpaths are being scoped; east end of Quinlan Avenue, from Fiveash Drive to Toohey Crescent and Hillrise Road, Panorama Drive to Alpha Crescent. I wish I could report more new footpaths, but funding is an issue. I will continue to lobby for 'new' footpath funding, at each budget discussion.

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Hello again. Well done everyone, we are at 91% vaccination first dose!

Last week at Council we finally received the long-awaited report into the **Craigburn Farm bushfire exits**, looking at Star Lily Street and Verdelho Street onto Cummings Street. Some key findings were a strong response of 720 residents; egress is not seen as adequate by 75%; the CFS support opening both streets year-round and that on Catastrophic days 75% leave, BUT 25% don't! Why not?

There will be at least five options to be considered on 9 November, including a trial opening of Verdelho Street with traffic monitoring for a year.

On the **\$20m James Road roundabout**, we finally have after a year and a FOI application the results of the community feedback. No surprises, it was 3:1 against. The petition is now at 782. In addition to my motion (passed unanimously) calling on the Minister to suspend works, I've asked that a further letter is sent updating DIT and the Minister with the increased number of petitioners and calling for certainty before bushfire season begins.

On the **Blackwood Hub**, we voted on 26 October to note the 50% completed design and revised cost estimates of +3.6%, included permeable paving to the NW car park and finalised two designs to progress to tender. One of those design changes is for a second lift, the need for which was strongly debated. The actual cost of the Hub will be confirmed following the market tender process commencing January. We are scheduled to break ground in late November/early December!

### Local Government -> ROADS-RUBBISH-RATES AND RENEWABLES

On the **Mitcham Community Solar Program** we had a briefing on 19 October; highlights were 205 downloads of our EOI, 15 interviews and 14 strong submissions. On 26 October we voted unanimously to allocate \$20,000 to engage expert legal and renewables experts to help with evaluating the responses and to help prepare the 2022 pilot.

From the EOI submissions received, it's clear:

- The value of energy as a (stored) commodity is that the up-front capital investment, interest costs, administrative costs and profit margins for providers can be easily recovered over time.
- The majority of submissions were centred on the creation of a City of Mitcham Virtual Power Plant, where energy is aggregated and sold 'behind the meter.' Payments of 54c per kw/H are realistic if energy can be sold when it's peak demand.
- There are significant organisations that are prepared to work with Council to develop a partnership model providing access to renewable energy technologies for ratepayers at no up-front cost.
- There are different financial roles Council can play from providing no funding whatsoever, underwriting debt, or providing direct funding (or any mix thereof).
- Council helps as a trusted advisor to the community connecting people to the most suitable renewable energy solution in their circumstance (in what is a complex and competitive market).
